
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
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This Report

This report uses a population health management approach to looking at the health of a whole group of people like a town, neighbourhood, or community instead of just focusing on one person at a time. It is designed to help community leaders, services, residents etc. understand what strengths of both people and place, whilst also looking into what health problems are common in that group, what services are needed most, and where help is lacking. By using data and trends, this Community Profile can inform tailored ways to keep people healthy, prevent illness, and make sure everyone gets the care they need. By focusing on prevention, early intervention, and coordinated care, together we can build healthier communities and support long-term, sustainable improvements in public health. The first Community Profile was written in 2023 and has been refreshed in 2025 to reflect the current opportunities and challenges of the community.

This report focuses on the community of Belle Vue and Lakeside, part of the Town ward in the Central locality of the city and begins with a summary outlining key information and priorities. This document includes conversations with communities, ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who live or work in the area. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people.

To ensure each community is represented as accurately as possible, where possible, separate data and illustrations have been used. Data that is only available at ward level will be stated when included. Indirectly Standardised Ratios (ISRs) have been used throughout this document and have been used to compare data at community and ward level, against a reference population. ISRs show how often an event (such as deaths or hospital admissions) occurs in a population compared to what would be expected in a reference population, after adjusting for age differences. England is used as the reference population for ISR's throughout the document.

One Page Summary

Belle Vue and Lakeside are part of Doncaster's Town Ward in the Central locality. While these communities rank among the least deprived areas in Doncaster (Belle Vue: 78th, Lakeside 52nd out of 88), pockets of deprivation persist, particularly affecting children and older residents.

Belle Vue and Lakeside have a combined population of approximately 2,220 (Belle Vue: 1,500; Lakeside: 720). The populations consist predominantly of working-age residents, with Belle Vue having slightly more younger residents and a higher population of older people. Ethnic diversity is notable: Belle Vue has 26.7% non-White UK residents, Lakeside 14.5%, both higher than the Doncaster average.

Childhood obesity rates are high, indicated at reception and Year 6. This is significant in Belle Vue where Year 6 obesity stands at 28.8%. Many children are overweight by school age.

Belle Vue and Lakeside residents live longer in good health than the Doncaster average. Healthy life expectancy for both males and females are around 61 years for both communities compared to about 57 for both males and females across Doncaster.

Belle Vue shows higher emergency admissions for coronary heart disease, stroke, and self-harm compared to Lakeside and Doncaster overall, and Belle Vue has a significant number of deaths under age 75 linked to lifestyle-related conditions. Smoking prevalence in Town Ward is 14.7%, and alcohol-related hospital admissions are higher in Belle Vue than Lakeside.

Employment levels are relatively high, but economic inactivity remains notable (Belle Vue: 38.4%, Lakeside: 28.9%). Poverty is rising, as 23% of Belle Vue residents and 15% of Lakeside residents experience poverty. Child poverty rates are 37.5% and 28.2% respectively. Fuel poverty affects 23.1% of households in Town Ward (including Belle Vue and Lakeside).

Community Priorities

- Reduce poverty and its impacts including child poverty, fuel poverty, and unemployment.
- Improve child development and tackle obesity
- Prevent premature deaths linked to lifestyle factors (e.g., smoking, alcohol, poor diet).
- Address mental health and self-harm (Belle Vue has the highest self-harm hospital admission rates across Doncaster communities (MSOA).
- Promote physical activity and healthy lifestyles across all age groups.

Assets

Well Doncaster uses community centred approaches that support investment in supporting, working with, and empowering communities to facilitate a healthy community. The voice and role of our communities and taking a strengths/assets-based approach to work with individuals, families and communities is crucial to the achievement of our overall vision.




Figure 1. Lakeside Business Assets (2024)




Figure 2. Lakeside Community Assets (2024)




Figure 3. Lakeside Health Assets (2024)




Figure 4. Belle Vue Business assets




Figure 5. Belle Vue Community assets




Figure 6. Belle Vue Health Assets (2024)


Population Health Management



Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

Appreciative Inquiry (AI) is a strength-based approach to understanding what is working well. It involves asking a series of structured questions which are analysed to identify themes that can be used to create positive change. The questions seek to understand past and present successes to help plan and create a bright and positive future. Used in a community setting, the process consists of four phases:

1. **Discovery Phase** – This will involve engagement with the residents of Hyde Park to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
2. **Dream** – Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
3. **Design** – All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
4. **Destiny** – A collaborative way of working and investing resources to meet the actions from the previous phase.

Well Doncaster have conducted community conversations in Belle Vue, Lakeside and the Town Ward from August 2021, and this has continued into 2025. Data was analysed using a framework analysis approach (Ritchie and Lewis, 2003). Thematic Analysis involves a systematic process of sifting, charting and sorting the material into key issues and themes allowing the integration of pre-existing themes into the emerging data analysis. The Thematic Framework has been created from conversations with residents, including those with postcodes in Belle Vue and Lakeside, from August 2021 - March 2025.

Theme	Commentary
Community	<p>A sense of community is created in the City Centre through community groups, organisations and events such as Doncaster Pride, the Races, food festivals and cultural celebrations. Residents and visitors to the City Centre talk about the idea of a community feel and 'coming together' at events hosted across the city. People mention strong relationships with family and friends and a sense of connection due to the proximity to others and shared experiences in the city centre. Resident also relish in fond memories about the centre, talking about how things used to be years ago and sharing these memories with others helps bring people together.</p>
Diversity and minority populations	<p>Cultural diversity is one of the more unique characteristics of the City Centre compared to other communities across the borough. Residents describe feeling welcomed and supported in their community and have an appreciation for the multicultural population often referencing faith institutions, cultures, languages and different backgrounds as prominent and a strength within the community.</p> <p>Many individuals talk about their own experiences having moved to the area under difficult circumstances. Despite language barriers and unfamiliar surroundings, people feel welcome and supported by the community and speak of growing confidence and happiness overtime. This illustrates a community shaped by movement, diversity, resilience and the need for connection and stability.</p>
Amenities	<p>Amenities play a central role in shaping positive experiences of place. Local shops, hairdressers, entertainment, food stalls and markets are frequently mentioned, with some highlighting the appeal of smaller stalls and world markets as vibrant alternatives to supermarkets. These amenities are not just practical; they contribute to the feel and makeup of the City Centre.</p> <p>Active transport and convenience are strongly reflected in residents' appreciation for walkability and central location to access amenities.</p>

City Centre Development	<p>Residents in the City Centre make noticeable references to recent developments in the Centre, showing their appreciation for the improvements. The appearance of newly developed places such as the areas around Cast and DGLAM are mentioned as a great asset to the city. Residents appreciate that they have lots to do in the city centre, giving them something to do in a place which feels modern and lively.</p> <p>Residents refer to the developments which have happened outside the train station. Some residents and local business owners have highlighted that there have been more visitors and more custom in the area since Doncaster's City status was announced and some also mention wider city development such as the new airport.</p>
Connectivity	<p>Residents describe being able to access shops, parks, the hospital, and cultural venues on foot, which not only supports a more active lifestyle but also reduces reliance on cars. Proximity to the motorway and public transport links further enhances the sense of ease and connectivity, making daily life more manageable and efficient.</p> <p>Responses about public transport in the City Centre is largely positive, with residents noting the reliability and frequency of buses and trains. Good transport links are seen as essential for staying connected, not just within Doncaster but also to nearby cities. Improved transport links is credited with increasing footfall in central, suggesting wider economic and social benefits to connectivity central and city centre.</p>
Environment	<p>Residents comment on the physical environment of the city centre as something they appreciate about their community; there's strong appreciation for easy access to green spaces, and people often note that where they live is peaceful and clean.</p> <p>Parks and green spaces are central to many residents' reflections. Potteric Carr, Elmfield Park, and Town Fields are seen as valuable community assets, offering space for recreation, events, and connection with nature. Town Fields is one of Doncaster's Future parks, as part of their continued work, future parks did a survey with 1181 responses. 434 people stated that they use the town fields at least once a day. When asked what would make them use the field more, their answers were community events, food and drinks events and Live music events.</p>
Health and Wellbeing	<p>Social wellbeing was also noted as important to health, with residents in the City Centre mentioning family as extremely important. When asked 'What is important to you about your Health and Wellbeing?' residents often mentioned living in a healthy environment. This was expressed in residents feeling it is important to live somewhere clean and have access to green spaces where they can exercise in the fresh air. A number of responses mention physical activity and express the benefits of walking groups both socially and physically. Residents also mention healthy behaviours such as healthy eating, and managing long term conditions is important to them.</p>

Residents from Belle Vue and Lakeside comment on local amenities and connectivity most frequently when asked 'what's good in their community?'. People talk about the proximity to the City Centre, good transport links for commuting and getting into town and local amenities including retail at Lakeside.

Doncaster Talks

In 2019, Doncaster Talks undertook an insight across the borough of Doncaster. Responses were separated into wards and thematically analysed. Across the town

ward, there were 246 responses recorded, which equates to 1.1% of the ward. The main themes on what people liked about the area, what could be improved, and what the borough should focus on are displayed in the figure below.




Figure 7. Doncaster Talks Insight, City of Doncaster Council, 2019

Health and Wealth

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population, and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Deprivation

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD).




Figure 8. Index of Multiple Deprivation Deciles 2025 – Doncaster, Office of National Statistics, 2025

The latest 2025 IMD data shows that Lakeside has an IMD score of 11.44 ranking 78th out of 88 communities in Doncaster. This is down from 12.5 in 2019 where Lakeside ranked 80th. Belle Vue has an IMD25 score of 19.38 ranking 52nd, down from 25.8 (53rd) in 2019.

The 2021 Census data has produced estimates that classify households in England and Wales by four dimensions of deprivation: employment, education, health and disability, and household overcrowding. Lakeside and Belle Vue have a higher proportion of households not in any deprived dimensions (67.9% and 51.3%) compared to Doncaster (43.7%) and England (48.4%). It also has lower proportion of households in all other dimensions: one dimension: Lakeside and Belle Vue (23.9% and 33.3%) compared to Doncaster (34.7%) and England (33.5%). Two dimensions; Lakeside and Belle Vue (6.7% and 12.2%) Doncaster (16.7%), England (14.2%). Three dimensions; Lakeside and Belle Vue (1.5% and 3.2%) Doncaster (4.6%) and England (3.7%) and four dimensions: Lakeside and Belle Vue (0% and 0%), Doncaster (0.2%) and England (0.2%).

Wealth Inequalities

In 2025, 11% of Bessacarr Grange & Lakeside Middle-layer Super Output Area (MSOA) residents are experiencing poverty, and 26.6% Belle Vue & Town Fields residents, similar to the Doncaster average of 29.3%. This is a significant increase from 2019, from 4.9% and 16% respectively.

The proportion of older people in poverty in Bessacarr Grange & Lakeside MSOA (7.3%) and in Belle Vue & Town Fields (15.9%) is lower than the Doncaster rate (19.4%), and similarly to all people, this has increased since 2019.

Furthermore, 19.1% of children are living in poverty in Bessacarr Grange & Lakeside MSOA and 41.3% in Belle Vue & Town Fields similar to the Doncaster average (47.1%), and an increase from 5.1% and 16.9% in 2019.

When considering the change from 2019 to 2025 data, it is important to note that there have been changes to the calculation of the source data, the income deprivation domain in the Indices of Multiple Deprivation. While it can be inferred that there has been an increase in the proportion of people living in poverty, the changes in this indicator may contribute to the significance of this change.

At community level, the data differs slightly, with 23% of Belle Vue residents experiencing poverty and 15% of Lakeside.




Figure 9. Poverty Prevalence using IMD25 – Source IMD 2025

Employment

The 2021 Census has given us new data based on the community of Lakeside and Belle Vue. 71.9% of residents in Lakeside are currently in employment and 63.3% in Belle Vue, which is higher than that of Doncaster (54.9%) and England (57.4%). There is a considerable number of these residents in Lakeside who work from home (29.3%) and Belle Vue (21.5%), and both are higher than the rate of Doncaster at 18.5%.

Additionally, 45.1% of people within Lakeside have not been employed in the last 12 months which is lower than the rate for Doncaster at 61.6%. Belle Vue has a slightly higher rate than Lakeside at 53.3% but is still below Doncaster. The Census 2021 data revealed that 28.3% of the population of Lakeside have been recorded as Never Worked and 33% for Belle Vue respectively, which is similar to the rate of Doncaster (27.2%) and England (25.6%).

Of those who work in Lakeside and Belle Vue, many people work full time (69.7% and 61.8%) which is slightly higher than that of Doncaster (60.7%) and England (59.1%). Part time working is just slightly lower for Lakeside (14.9%) than the Doncaster rate (20.7%) and England (19.5%) with Belle Vue having a similar average rate (20.7%). When looking at economically inactive residents, that is those who are unemployed, over 16 years old, and not actively looking for employment, Lakeside has 28.9% of its residents that are classed as economically inactive, and Belle Vue has 38.4%.




Figure 10. Occupations for Lakeside and Belle Vue Residents, Office of National Statistics, 2021

The census has also showed us that those in Professional Occupations in Lakeside (24.8%) and Belle Vue (17.1%) is considerably more than that of Doncaster (12.8%) and on par with England (20.3%). This follows suit with the roles of – Managers, Directors and Senior Officials and Associate professional and technical occupations, as seen in Figure 10.

Fuel Poverty

Fuel poverty is directly linked to energy efficiency, energy prices and household income. Fuel poverty is distinct from general poverty: not all poor households are fuel

poor, and some households would not normally be considered poor but could be pushed into fuel poverty if they have high energy costs. Evidence shows that living in cold homes is associated with poor health outcomes and an increased risk of morbidity and mortality for all age groups. Furthermore, studies have shown that more than one in five (21.5%) excess winter deaths in England and Wales are attributable to the coldest quarter of housing.

Modelled estimates of the proportion of households in fuel poverty shows that 18.8% of households in Doncaster are living in fuel poverty. At a ward level, 23.1% of households in the Town ward are experiencing fuel poverty, higher than the Doncaster and England (13.2%) rate.




Figure 11. Households in Fuel Poverty Ranked by Ward, Office of National Statistics, 2020

Figure 11 illustrates wards ranked by households in fuel poverty and shows Town ward falls within the top three most effected by fuel poverty.

Food Poverty

There are 7 active foodbanks in the Central locality of Doncaster. Across fiscal years 2024-2025, Central foodbanks supported 5102 individuals, 2333 single parents, 4170 families, 1488 couples and 91 'other' and ranked as the highest locality for relative level of foodbank support. The most recent data from 2025 shows that across the Central foodbanks the highest number of people supported by type were individuals and single parents. This has changed from fiscal year 2024-2025 data where there were significantly more couples seeking support.

The closest foodbank to residents in Belle Vue and Lakeside is Doncaster Foodbank located at St James' Church in the City Centre, or at the Church of St John the Evangelist in Balby.

The most recent foodbank data from 2025 shows that the top five reasons for accessing foodbanks across the borough are: cost of living (602 residents), low income (524 residents), benefits delay (468 residents), debt (456 residents) and benefit changes (447 residents). Figure 12 shows a tree map chart showing an overview of the reasons residents are requiring foodbank support.

The Bread-and-Butter Thing

There are five Bread and Butter Thing (TBBT) Hubs based in the following communities across the borough: Mexborough, Rossington, Carcroft, Thorne and Hexthorpe. Each site offers 80 residents the opportunity to access affordable food, ensuring 400 residents per week get the help they need. The purpose is to reduce poverty premiums that families in low-income areas can face, to reduce waste by identifying edible surplus food in the UK food sector and redistributing it and to build resilience within the communities.

The mobile food hub gives access to nutritious and affordable food taken into the heart of communities starved of money, food, and resources. The food parcels are based on a weekly shop providing essential produce for families including fresh fruit and veg, chilled goods and cupboard staples. By discounting a family's shopping, a members average weekly saving is £26.50.

The King's Cross Church in Hexthorpe operates the TBBT in the central locality. TBBT provides residents with food parcels made from surplus food and is sold at an affordable price. The initiative aims to help people move up the food ladder by acting

as a financial bridge and supporting with cost of living. TBBT is open to any residents from Doncaster and may provide support to people from postcodes boroughwide.




Figure 13. Postcode Map Showing Residents Accessing TBBT Throughout Fiscal Year 2024/25, The Brad and Butter Thing, 2025

In 2024 across the five sites, 3241 residents accessed TBBT, and 1596 volunteering opportunities were filled. Figure 13 shows the postcode areas of residents in Central Doncaster accessing TBBT throughout the fiscal year 2024/25 and indicates dense clusters in areas of higher deprivation including City Centre, Hyde Park, Hexthorpe and Balby. The access data suggests residents from various areas in Central Doncaster are receiving support from food parcels via TBBT, but particularly residents from more deprived communities. Data points from Belle Vue and Lakeside suggest fewer residents are accessing TBBT from these communities.

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough (CADB) is an independent, local charity and a member of the Citizens Advice network. They provide free advice and support to meet the needs of communities. This includes advice on a range of problems, such as with work, debt, benefits, immigration, housing and more.

In the Fiscal Year 2024/25, data shows that 421 clients were supported in the Town ward across 228 postcodes. This has fallen from recent years, as in fiscal year 2023/24, 617 clients were supported by CADB services. The total income gain, that is the amount of additional income that a client receives because of support or intervention from CADB, has increased to £20,616,502 as of 2025 with




Figure 14. CADB Interactions Fiscal Year 2024/25, Citizens Advice Doncaster, Borough, 2025

Figure 14 indicates where residents are accessing support from in Town ward, including Belle Vue and Lakeside. The purple dots represent the postcodes of clients accessing support throughout fiscal year 2024/25 in Town ward showing clusters around Hyde Park and fewer residents accessing support from Belle Vue and Lakeside.

The top five reasons residents from Town ward access support are: debt, benefits and tax credits, utilities and communications, consumer goods and services, and lastly benefits and universal credit. More specifically in Town ward, residents report debt relief orders as the primary reason for seeking support. Town ward ranks as the highest ward in the Central locality seeking support from CADB. Table 4 shows a breakdown of CADB data comparing Town ward to the other top 5 Central wards accessing support through CADB.

Health Inequalities

Life Expectancy

MSOA data is available for life expectancy in Belle Vue and Lakeside across years 2019-2023. In Belle Vue the 'Belle Vue and Town Fields' MSOA shows life expectancy was 74.8 for Males and 79.3 for Females. This is lower than Doncaster (77.2 for Males and 80.8 for Females) and England (79.1 for Males and 83 for Females). MSOA data for Lakeside is from 'Bessacarr Grange and Lakeside' MSOA and shows life expectancy is 81.9 for Males and 85.5 for Females, both higher than Doncaster and England.

Healthy life expectancy is the number of years a person lives in good health. Healthy life expectancy according to the Office of National Statistics (ONS, 2021-23) is 54.9 for Males and 57.9 years for Females across Town ward (including Belle Vue and Lakeside). Healthy Life expectancy in Doncaster is 57.3 for Males and 57.7 for Females and in England, healthy life expectancy is 61.5 for Males and 61.9 for Females.





Figure 15. Male and Female Life Expectancy Across Years 2019-2023 by MSOA, Office of National Statistics, 2025

Long-Term Health Conditions

The 2021 Census shows us that 53.2% of residents live in 'very good health', in Lakeside and 46.3% in Belle Vue, which is higher than the rate for Doncaster 44.3%. 34.5% live in 'good health' in Lakeside and 37.6% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 34.1%). 8.8% live in 'fair health' in Lakeside and 11.7% in Belle Vue (18.2%). 2.3% live with bad health in Lakeside and 3.5% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 5.3%), and 1.1% live with 'very bad health in Lakeside and 0.9% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 1.6%). Specifically, hospital admissions due to heart attack (82.4 per 100) are the highest ISR in Bessacarr Grange and Lakeside MSOA, and self-harm is the highest in Belle Vue and Town Field MSOA with an ISR of 180.6 per 100.

Emergency hospital admissions largely associated with health conditions related to poor lifestyle choices are also more likely across those severely deprived communities. Lakeside is lower for all hospital admissions across the board compared to Doncaster and national rates, whereas Belle Vue/Town fields MSOA is higher across all categories.

Incidence of Death

The highest ratio of all-cause mortality within Belle Vue and Town Fields MSOA is mortality from Stroke, with a ratio of 175.2 per 100 compared to England as the benchmark (100/100) and Doncaster (107.1/100). There is a considerably higher proportion of preventable deaths in under 75's compared to England and Doncaster. Belle Vue's mortality ISR when looking at preventable deaths in under 75's is 161/100 (using England as the comparator, 100/100) and is higher than Doncaster (132.9/100).

Lakeside MSOA is considerably different to Belle Vue MSOA data. The 'Bessacarr Grange and Lakeside' MSOA show mortality from coronary heart disease has the highest ratio among all causes of mortality (90.3/100) compared to England (100/100) and Doncaster (142.2). However, this is still lower than both Doncaster and England.

The higher ratio of preventable deaths within the Belle Vue MSOA suggests measures may be needed to improve lifestyle choices that could impact these figures. However, data from MSOA must be considered carefully when considering hyper-local solutions as the data between areas across a MSOA can vary.




Figure 17. Deaths and Preventable Death Rate Compared to England 2019/20-2021/22, Office of National Statistics, 2022




Figure 18: All Age Deaths per 100 Compared to England, Office of National Statistics, 2022

Deaths ratios from all causes and all ages across Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange, aside from 'all cancers' are lower than those of for Doncaster and England. This is the opposite for Belle Vue/Town Fields.




Figure 19. Causes of Deaths Under 75, Office of National Statistics, 2022

Lakeside/Bessacarr grange has one of the lowest death ratios in under 75's across Doncaster. The chart shows that Bessacarr has a significantly lower death rate in all areas under 75 compared to Doncaster and England. Belle Vue/Town fields is higher across all-causes death, cancer and circulatory disease.

Alcohol

The data supplied by the ONS shows that Bessacarr Grange and Lakeside is the 2nd lowest area in Doncaster for hospital admissions due to alcohol attributable conditions with an ISR of 83.9/100 with England as the benchmark (100/100). In contrast, Belle Vue and Town Fields MSOA has the 5th highest ratio in the borough (133.3/100), and higher than the Doncaster average (112.7/100).




Figure 20. Alcohol Admissions by Ward 2016/17-20/21, Office of National Statistics, 2021

Smoking

Data from Action on Smoking and Health (ASH, 2024), indicates smoking rates in Town ward stands at 14.7%. This is lower than the Doncaster (15.7%) rate but significantly higher than England (10.4%).

Doncaster has the highest percentage of registered smokers compared to our surrounding boroughs Rotherham (16.48%), Barnsley (17.11%), Sheffield (13.92%) and Other (14.46%). ASH estimates smoking costs Doncaster £335 million per year, the combined cost of smoking-related medical treatment via hospital admission and primary care services is £16.5 million. Social care costs due to smoking amounts to

an estimated £115 million annually in Doncaster with the majority being lost to informal care costs from friends and family (£64.3 million).

In Town ward, the gross annual cost of smoking as of Spring 2024 was £18.4 million, the highest across the borough, and 14.7% of the ward's population smoke. An estimated £6.72 million is spent annually on tobacco products in Town ward and the national average spend on tobacco per smoker now stands at £2486. Smoking has a significant impact on employment and productivity. In Town ward the total cost due to lost productivity from smoking was estimated at £12.5 million which is significantly higher than the borough average (£6.5M) and the highest across all other electoral wards in Doncaster (ASH 2024).

Childhood Development

A child's early experiences are vital in providing the foundations for children to develop healthily and happily. Children being born into deprivation and living amongst deprivation in their early years are more likely to experience a wide range of health problems, fall behind their peers and face employment problems in adult life. The quality of early experiences is important as children develop, providing opportunity for motor (physical), intellectual (language and communication), cognitive and socio-emotional development.

The Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI) measures the proportion of all children aged 0 to 15 living in income deprived families. In Belle Vue 37.5% of children are classed as living in child poverty and 28.2% in Lakeside, which is less than the Doncaster rate (47.1%).




Figure 21. Children in Poverty: Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (aged 0 to 15), Office of National Statistics, 2025

The general fertility rate, live births in Lakeside is 56.2 with 1.1% born to teenage mothers. In Belle Vue the general fertility rate, live births are 57, with 1.1% born to teenage mothers.

During adolescence and young adulthood, hospital admissions amongst individuals aged 15-24 years of age are the 6th lowest in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange (114 people per 10,000) compared to the rate of Doncaster (161.66 people per 10,000). Belle Vue/Town Fields (224.9 people per 10,000) is a lot higher than its neighbouring community and Doncaster.

Childhood Obesity

Healthy development milestones from early to middle childhood continue to be an area of concern across Doncaster with higher levels of obesity at reception age and Year 6 across the borough compared to England. Using the latest data from combined years 2022/23-2024/25 from the closest geographical area to Belle Vue/Town Field MSOA and Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange MSOA, data can be compared to Doncaster and England in figure 22. The prevalence of children classified as overweight (including obese) and obese (including severely obese) in Year 6 is higher in Belle Vue at 45.8% and 28.8% respectively, compared to Doncaster and England. Data from Lakeside/Bessacarr MSOA indicates overweightness and obesity is more in line with Doncaster and England compared to Belle Vue and can be seen in table 5.

Family Hubs

Family Hubs are local, community-based centres that offer integrated services for families from the early stages of life covering conception and early childhood up to adolescence, and up to age 25 for individuals with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND). Family Hubs offer early years and parental support including antenatal and postnatal care, baby and toddler classes, infant feeding, parenting programmes, SEND pathways and specialist support for mental health, domestic abuse, welfare and substance misuse. Family Hubs provide welcoming community spaces for families, bringing together education, health, social care, and wellbeing services into one facility and cater for a broad spectrum of needs. There are twelve Family Hubs across Doncaster, with three located in the Central locality which are Central, Balby and Wheatley Family Hubs.

Membership data shows the percentage of eligible children signed up to Family Hubs. In Q4 of fiscal year 2024-2025, membership of children in Belle Vue was 80% for children aged 0-8 weeks, 83% for 0-1 year and 11-month-old children and 84% for children aged between 0-4 years and 11 months. Average membership across all Family Hubs in Central across all ages for fiscal year 2024-2025 was 84%.

Access data includes the percentage of children using Family Hubs services once or twice and engagement figures indicate the number of children seen three or more times.

Engagement for children in Belle Vue aged 0-1 years and 11 months was 43% by Q4 of fiscal year 2024-25. Engagement increases to 59% when including all ages up to 0-4 years and 11 months. The average yearly access and engagement figures from Central Family Hubs across Central communities (including all ages) are shown in table 3. The data shows that the average yearly membership across all Central communities (84%), is similar to the latest available Q4 data for Belle Vue service users. However, Belle Vue access and engagement is lower than the average yearly figures.

Family Hubs facilitate 2-Year-Old Funding Entitlement for families which provides up to 15 hours of free early education or childcare per week for 38 weeks of the year. The latest data from Summer 2025 indicates 62.4% of eligible children in Doncaster have taken up 2-year-old funding when recorded at the start of term. This was 100% for Belle Vue and Lakeside. When looking at data for late starters for the same year, Doncaster saw 64% take-up in comparison to no take up in Belle Vue and Lakeside. 2-year-old funding uptake is lower across Central Family Hubs in Summer 2025 at the beginning of term (54.5%) and for late starters (56.4%) compared to Doncaster 62.4% and 64% respectively.

School Attainment

The Department for Education supplies each local authority with the school attainment grades for those in Key Stage 2 (KS2) and Key Stage 4 (KS4).

In 2022, at KS2, 50% and 60% of pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, and mathematics in Belle Vue and Lakeside respectively. This was significantly lower in Belle Vue than Doncaster (56%) and England (59%). In contrast, more Lakeside pupils achieved expected scores than locally and nationally. In 2023, pupils achieving expected scores was 46% in Belle Vue and 71% in Lakeside compared to 55% across Doncaster and 60% nationally. Most recently in 2024, Belle Vue saw a promising increase in the percentage of pupils achieving expected grades at KS2, rising to 68%. This was higher than Doncaster (59%) and England (61%). Pupils from Lakeside saw similar positive trends in 2023 with 82% achieving expected scores.

At KS4, each pupil is given an Attainment 8 score (a score out of 90) based on their 8 best GCSE grades including English, Maths and at least 3 other traditional academic GCSEs (sciences, languages, and humanities). Other qualifications at an equivalent level (e.g. BTECs) can also count towards the score.

The average scores in 2022 at KS4 were 50.9 for Belle Vue pupils and 47.1 for Lakeside. The average score across Doncaster was 44.9 and the national average was 48.8. In 2023, Belle Vue increases the average score to 53.2 and Lakeside pupils scored an average of 49.3. Both communities were above the Doncaster (44.4) and England (46.3) average. The latest available results for 2024 show trends in Belle Vue continue to improve with average KS4 results increasing to 55. Lakeside pupils achieved an average of 53.9. Belle Vue and Lakeside outperformed both the Doncaster (44) and national (45.9) average that year.

Three children from Belle Vue have been recorded as receiving Elective Home Education and one pupil is recorded as missing from education. There are no recorded pupils missing from education or receiving Elective Home Education from Lakeside (City of Doncaster Council, 2025).

Pupil Lifestyle Survey

The Pupil Lifestyle Survey is conducted by Doncaster City Council to provide valuable data on children and young people's health-related behaviour, through an anonymous school-based questionnaire. Data from the survey has provided a set of Doncaster-wide figures at key points in children and young people's development; KS2, 3 and 4. Data is presented at ward level.

The 2024 Pupil Lifestyle Survey saw 3810 pupils participate from Years 4,6,8 and 10 with 264 from Town Ward. Of the total responses 49% were boys and 48% were girls and within the Town Ward 49% of responses were from boys and 47% from girls. 12% of pupils reported themselves as having special educational needs, lower than the Doncaster average of 13%. When asked if they receive extra help in school, 24% reported that they did, significantly lower than Doncaster (43%).

The 2024 Pupil Lifestyle Survey reported 14% of pupils in Town Ward have a long-standing illness in line with the Doncaster average. 6% of pupils reported having a disability which was lower than the Doncaster average of 9%. Town Ward had the 3rd highest number of pupils where English is their second language at 35%, significantly higher than the Doncaster average (23%).

In 2024 when asked about healthy eating and wellbeing, 87% reported to having a regular breakfast but only 43% of pupils have a school dinner, lower than the Doncaster average of 52%. Those receiving free school meals is lower than the Doncaster average at 17% compared to 19%. Despite much of the Town ward (including Belle Vue and Lakeside) being close to local amenities, such as shops and

takeaways, only 10% of pupils report having takeaway food regularly during school time. This was the joint second lowest across all wards.

76% of pupils feel they get love and support at home, on par with Doncaster (77%) and 89% feel safe at home, also in line with Doncaster (88%).




Figure 23. Pupil Lifestyle Survey Results, City of Doncaster Council, 2024




Figure 24. Levels of Inactivity Within Households Across Doncaster, Get Doncaster Moving, 2023

Physical Activity in Children and Young People

Data from the Pupil Lifestyle Survey 2022 shows that 16% of children are physically active on only one or two days a week, with 31% being active on three or four days, and 51% on five or more occasions. In 2024, 18% of children reported to be physically active on one or two days a week, 29% are active three or four days a week and 49% on five or more days per week. 80% of pupils said they enjoy physical activity, and of the pupils that said they do not enjoy physical activity, the most common reason for not participating was 'preferring to do other things'.

Green Spaces & Parks

Lakeside Lake and Lakeside Hill are the largest green spaces for residents to use who live in Lakeside and Belle Vue. There are 3 parks located in the vicinity – Buttermere Crescent Park, Runway Park and Belle Vue Avenue/Hyde Park play areas. All are easily accessible to residents. The parks consist of toddler and junior play areas.

Community Information

Population and Diversity

Around 14.5% of residents in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange stated their ethnicity as “not White UK” with 26.7% in Belle Vue/Town Fields, although the specific categories and languages spoken are unknown, closely followed by ‘not white’ at 10.6% and 14.7% respectively. These communities have a low percentage of non-English speakers (1.2% & 5.4%).

Population Size

- 1,500 Belle Vue

Age Profile

Working age adults make up the largest proportion of the population in both Lakeside and Belle Vue. Belle Vue does have a higher rate of younger residents compared to Lakeside and Doncaster. The census 2021 data shows that Belle Vue also has a slightly higher rate of elderly residents living in the community compared to Lakeside.




Figure 25. Age Profiles of Lakeside Community, Office of National Statistics, 2021




Figure 26. Age Profiles of Belle Vue Community, Office of National Statistics, 2021

Housing

Most of the housing in Lakeside and Belle Vue are 'new builds' and consist of whole houses, flats and apartments. There is a high proportion of residents that outright own their house (65.7% and 85.2%) compared to that of Doncaster (33.6%).




Figure 27. Accommodation Type in Lakeside and Belle Vue, Office of National Statistics, 2021

St Leger Homes is the main provider of Doncaster's Social Housing. St Leger homes own 2x three bed houses in Lakeside. The properties are occupied by 46–65-year-olds and rent arrears stand at £121 as of fiscal year 2022/23, one of the lowest amounts in the city. St Leger Homes do not manage any houses in Belle Vue.

Community Safety

Community safety remains a top priority for residents and stakeholders across Doncaster. Feedback from a range of engagement activities consistently highlights concerns around anti-social behaviour, crime, and perceptions of safety. People want cleaner, more vibrant and welcoming neighbourhoods, supported by effective policing, youth engagement, and thoughtful environmental design.

To help achieve this, we're committed to a city-wide approach that combines proactive and reactive measures through a layered crime prevention strategy—primary, secondary, and tertiary—designed to make every community safer.

The Safer Stronger Doncaster Partnership

The Safer Stronger Doncaster Partnership is working together to make Doncaster a safer, stronger place for everyone. The partnership focuses on six key priorities that tackle issues affecting our communities:

- **Reducing anti-social behaviour** – making our streets and public spaces welcoming for all.
- **Reducing crime and re-offending** – supporting people to make positive choices and preventing repeat offences.
- **Tackling serious and organised crime** – protecting our communities from organised criminality and criminal networks.
- **Reducing substance and alcohol misuse** – helping people access support and reducing harm.
- **Tackling domestic and sexual abuse** – ensuring victims get the help they need and holding perpetrators to account.
- **Reducing violence and violent crime** – creating safer neighbourhoods for families and young people.

Together, these priorities aim to build a Doncaster where everyone feels safe and supported.

Community Voice / Key Safety Concerns

People in Central Doncaster told us that safety feels very mixed—some areas feel secure, while others are struggling with anti-social behaviour and environmental issues. Residents spoke about loitering, street drinking, and intimidation in certain hotspots, alongside concerns about fly-tipping and poorly maintained public spaces. Many said they want more visible policing and enforcement to tackle these problems and restore confidence. There's also a call for better youth services and safe spaces to reduce disruption and give young people positive options. Overall, the community wants cleaner streets, stronger enforcement, and more opportunities to bring people together and rebuild pride in Central Doncaster.

Crime & Anti-Social Behaviour

Data provided by City of Doncaster Council shows that the rate of anti-social behaviour (ASB), early intervention, hate crimes and low-level crime in the Central locality is the second highest for Doncaster.




Figure 29. ASB Incidents by Locality, City of Doncaster Council, 2024

The report shows that the Central Locality is the second highest locality in Doncaster for early interventions, ASB, hate crime and low-level crime. Of these incidents 94 of them are recorded in Bessacarr. This is shown in figure 29.

Through partnership working with South Yorkshire Police, data has been provided of ASB incidents reported to the police. The Central Locality is currently the highest ASB reporter for the whole of Doncaster with 604 recorded.

Vulnerable Victims




Figure 30. Number of Vulnerable Victim Cases by Locality City of Doncaster Council, 2024

The number of vulnerable victims for each Locality is also recorded. Figure 30 shows that Central is again the second highest area of Doncaster. East Locality (82) has double that of Central (41) but likewise Central has more than double of the North Locality (22).

Wellbeing Service

The Wellbeing Service helps residents with financial support, physical health, housing, mental health and social isolation, preventing escalation into social care services. From the most recent data in Q4 of fiscal year 2024-25, Town Ward residents accessed the Wellbeing Service most frequently for support. In the last full fiscal year 2023/24, Town ward ranked as the 5th highest ward accessing the Wellbeing Service.

Community Investment

As of July 2025, there has been £12.3 million of investment into the Central Locality from Doncaster Delivering Together. This investment has been successfully applied for by partners and Voluntary Community and Faith Sector (VCFS) groups. The top 3 areas of funding spend are increasing community spirit (£879,798.09), mental health support and awareness (£594,269.79) and using and improving community assets (£562,444.14).

The top three areas of spending for the VCFS in the Town Ward were increasing community spirit (£468,175.48), children and young peoples' provision (£461,969.04) and mental health support and awareness (£329,064.61). Investment into Belle Vue and Lakeside includes over £20,000 towards all age physical activities, funding to support youth activities, one to one support, and welcome spaces. Figure 31 indicates

areas of funding across Belle Vue and Lakeside, where the size of each point represents the scale of investment.





Mosaic Public Sector classifies the UK population into one of 66 types and 15 groups through a detailed and accurate understanding of each citizen's demographics, lifestyles, behaviours and location.

The MOSAIC types who "Do not exercise" and "Do not take part in Sport" were searched and three priority groups have been identified through work with strategic

partners as part of the development of Doncaster's Physical Activity Strategy. The three priority groups are:

- The Inactive
- Families with children and young people
- People living in income deprivation

These groups are cross-referenced against the inactivity list allowing for the identification of MOSAIC types which are both likely to be inactive and living in deprivation as well as inactive and from households with children and young people.
